

From The Rector

Dear Friends,

On Monday of this week, nearly forty community leaders gathered at the Eagle Ridge Retreat Center to begin a two-year process of intentionally reimagining how material poverty is addressed in Bowling Green and Warren County. The City Shapers process is an outflow of the Reimagine Charity event that Christ Church co-hosted with HOTEL, INC. last August. At that event, we learned about how the traditional models of charity – those who have giving something to those who have not – aren't always the best approach. Not that this model is inherently bad, or even that it needs to go away entirely, but that it glosses over the profound difference between crisis and chronic needs.



This new way of thinking about charity struck a chord with a diverse group of people – from city employees to non-profit leaders to business owners to the faith community. With the help of the Lupton Center from Historic South Atlanta, seven teams will spend the next two years assessing our programs and the community's needs, aligning resources, and activating a plan (or maybe several plans) to address the needs of those

experiencing material poverty in the West End of Bowling Green and the wider community. It will require a lot of time, a lot of prayer, and a lot of work to move through the three phases over the next 24 months. It will also require a lot more people than those who met at Eagle Ridge last week.

In the coming months, you'll might be invited to take a survey, to attend a community meeting, to be interviewed, or to share your story. I hope that you'll engage in the process as best as you are able. The more voices we hear from, the better and more truthful our assessment can be, and with better assessment comes better results.

I'm grateful to the Vestry for allocating the resources from our Porter Sims Trust funds to pay for our portion of the consulting fees. I'm excited for the team Christ Church has working this, as well. Kevin Brooks, Shelley Carter, Susan Cook, Paula Maier, Kellie Mysinger, and Barbie Tatman will represent us well and are committed to the task at hand. Thank you also to Laura Goodwin for her willingness to serve on the Habitat for Humanity team.

You'll be hearing a lot more about City Shapers, but in the meantime, I invite you to pray for our community as we rethink how we live out the Gospel call to love our neighbors.

From The Associate Rector

It doesn't take much of a break to realize just how deeply what kind of content that we consume significantly shapes how we see the world around us. When I spent three months living in Brazil about a decade ago, one of the things that I noticed was the relief that I felt in navigating the streets. I was learning Portuguese and had a conversational grasp, but billboards and most signs were far above my language ability. It was so freeing to not be constantly assaulted with commercials and messages telling me what I needed or who I ought to be.

One of the things that I am hoping to be more intentional about in this season, and in this year, is what kind of content I consume; endless scrolling on various social media or a streaming service that automatically plays the next episode are defaults that I need to disrupt. One of the ways that I am doing this is to give up television and streaming shows; it won't be easy, but I'm looking forward to the relief that I felt on those city streets in Brazil. I anticipate that not constantly being 'on' will help me be more fully present to those around me, and to where God might be calling.

In addition to that, I'm also trying to read more. It happens to most folks I know, but picking up a reading habit after being in seminary is tricky. So much of the work that goes on then is required reading, and so once it's no longer required, it takes a while to get back into reading for fun. There was a long list of books waiting for me to read them, but as I work through that list, I'm starting to seek out books. And in that, I'm trying to be more intentional about whose voice I invite in by intentionally reading people who are not like me. Incorporating voices of color, or perspectives that are new and intriguing to me, have helped guide and shape my choices.



For the month of February, I only read black voices, and I was surprised at how much it has changed me and my perspective. I read some of the greats and I read people who I know and admire; none of them were of the same mind or perspective on everything and the thing that has stuck with me the most is just how transformative nuance can be. To have a nuanced perspective on a community of which I am not a part forces me to hold a 3-D picture; it makes me resist flattening the perspective of those who differ from me.

Recently, I've been struck by the phrase, *posture of curiosity*. I'm quite enthralled these days with the idea that taking on a posture of curiosity can change how quickly we react to something or what assumptions we might make about it. I wonder what taking on this posture of curiosity would mean for you in your own fast this Lenten season? If your fast is food related, begin to get curious about where your food comes from, or how it got to your table. If you are taking a break from social media, maybe get curious about how you are different from when those scrolling voices speak into your life, and consider if and how you are better without them. If you, like me, are limiting your content consumption, whether television or podcasts, perhaps a posture of curiosity can help you understand who gets to take up space in your limited attention, and how does giving attention to something orient us to God or others?

Whatever your fast holds, my prayer is that you are able to grow in faith and repentance this holy season!

I believe our partnership with those who keep the faith of Jesus alive in the region, where our Lord walked and began his movement, is a significant aspect of our work as part of the church catholic.




In the year 46CE a famine descended upon Jerusalem. When St. Paul learned of this he decided to raise funds among the churches he had established in Galatia and Greece to bring relief to the ‘saints’ in Jerusalem. Christianity was in its infancy, and significant debate was under way about how Jewish a believer had to be to be a follower of Jesus. St. James, leader of the church in Jerusalem and St. Paul, apostle to the Gentiles (as he came to be known) struggled with how to resolve this tension. Paul’s letters and the Book of Acts are full of the details of this identity crisis.

And then there’s the famine . . . Despite the issues surrounding whether or not baptism was enough to demonstrate one’s faith in Christ, there were the real and ongoing needs of the saints in Jerusalem. St. Paul knew of the need of his sisters and brothers in Christ in the Holy City and wrote (and no doubt preached) extensively to encourage others to be generous from their own pockets to provide for the needs of others – in this case, the ‘saints’ in Jerusalem.

St. Paul recognized the spiritual benefit of the connection between his gentile followers of Jesus, spread at that time throughout modern Turkey and Greece, with the faithful in the land where Jesus was born, lived, died and rose again. St.

Paul would never use a term like ‘solidarity’ to describe the importance of this relationship with the believers in Jerusalem, but that is what he sought. He sought a sense of solidarity, a unity of spirit beyond the categories of ‘Jew’ or ‘gentile’ – indeed being neither male nor female, but one in Christ Jesus.

The Good Friday Offering carries on a similar witness as a tangible connection between Christians in the Episcopal Church and the saints, Christians throughout the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East who welcome our prayers, advocacy and financial support in keeping the faith alive through their ministries of education, health care, pastoral care and hospitality throughout the Land of the Holy One.



From Episcopal Relief & Development

On Contagious Diseases in Church - Still in the midst of a severe flu season and with increased attention on the Coronavirus (COVID-19) and its spread around the globe, Episcopal Relief and Development and the Diocese of Kentucky have issued some basic guidelines for preventing the spread of contagious diseases in church. On our end, Christ Church will make hand sanitizer available at the two main entrances to the Nave, as well as having it in Surface and Moore Halls. Clergy distributing wafers will sanitize their hands after the Peace to ensure the safety of our communicants. To help us all out, we ask that you follow a few simple guidelines as well.

- If you are sick, please stay home.
- Wash your hands after using the restroom, coughing or sneezing, and before handling food.
- If you feel uncomfortable shaking hands, a wave hello or eye contact and a hand on your heart at the Peace are certainly acceptable alternatives.

Finally, studies have shown that when it is wiped with a clean purificator and rotated after each communicant, sipping from the common cup, whether it is silver or ceramic, is the most sanitary way to receive the consecrated wine at communion. If you would prefer to intinct, please ensure that your fingers do not dip into the wine or tap the inside of the chalice. Also, please remember that receiving in one kind, that is bread or wine only, does not diminish the efficacy of the Eucharist. God's ability to impart grace exists well beyond our need to prevent the spread of communicable diseases.



The children of Dishman McGinnis need and want YOU!!! We are looking for people to commit to visiting a child at least twice monthly. This can be either reading with the child or eating lunch with them. That is basically up to the mentor. We are looking for you to spend approximately 20 minutes twice a month getting to know a child.






