From The Rector

Dear Friends,

As the old saying goes, numbers don't tell the whole story...but they do tell us some of it.

My undergraduate degree is in business administration, so I love numbers. The feeling that comes from getting a spreadsheet to do what you want it brings me an irrational amount of joy. So it is that over the last few weeks, in my spare time, I've been tackling the complicated question of "how many folks are worshipping with us post-COVID?" In the olden days, PC (Pre-COVID), this question was an easy one to answer. Whether it was Gretchen Broderick from her perch in the back of the Nave at 8 AM, or the ushers at about 10:15, meticulously counting heads in pews, surplices in the choir loft, and squirming bodies in Children's Church, the number of people who were worshipping with us was quite easy to know.

During the height of the pandemic, when only eight of us were in the building on Sunday morning, while the live stream went to your TV, computer, tablet, or phone, I gave up counting. There was just no good way to guess how many people were really engaged in worship on any given Sunday, not to mention those who might sleep in and watch the service later that day, week, or month. Congregations, judicatories, and even whole denominations tried to come up with some kind of way to do the math, but language and metrics got in the way. On Facebook, they count 3-second views, 15-second views, and 1-minute views. On YouTube, the numbers are different. There is no metric based on length of view, but simply the number of concurrent streams; how many people are watching at the same time. Do any of those really count as worship?

It's been $3\frac{1}{2}$ years since we scrambled to produce an online only worship service on March 15, 2020, and we're back to counting a good number of people in the pews, but we've still be missing the community of the faithful who worship with us at 8 AM, 10 AM, or sometime later through Facebook or YouTube. Time, research, and the chance to do some reflection



brings us now to the place where it seems doable to at least reasonably estimate the number of people who are with us online, and the Vestry has made it one of its goals to get a handle on those numbers.

I'll save you all the gory details of the calculations, but suffice it so say that our Average Sunday Attendance in-person now stands at 156, which is down 28% from 2019's number of 217. That's the bad news. The good news is that our Average Weekly Viewership of Sunday worship is 99, which puts our Average Sunday Engagement at 255, up 17.5% from 2019.

Numbers don't tell the whole story. Of those 99 people who are taking part in some part of our Sunday worship online are visitors checking us out, folks who work on Sunday mornings, people's whose health condition means they are still quite worried about getting COVID, and folks who have just fallen out of the habit of coming to church. Their experience of community is certainly diminished, no one would argue otherwise, but having spoken with many members of our online community, they are all grateful for the opportunity to stay connected, to hear the word of God proclaimed, to occasionally sing along to a beloved hymn in their pajamas, and to remain a part of the Christ Church family, and we are better off having them among us.

From The Associate Rector

Some of you know that I've only been an Episcopalian for about ten years, six of which have been as an ordained person. While my old religious tradition (Church of Christ) differs quite a bit from the Episcopal Church, I found that the things that I learned to deeply value: scripture, baptism, and communion, where all deeply valued in the Episcopal Church as well. The biggest learning curve in making this transition was the Conventions. In particular, the difference between the Diocesan Convention and the General Convention confused me a bit. Since the Diocese of Kentucky is hosting the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Louisville in June of 2024 and we at Christ Church, Bowling Green are hosting our Diocesan Convention in November of 2023, I thought I'd break down the difference between the two to help provide some clarity.

The Diocese of Kentucky Convention – November 10-11, 2023 Christ Episcopal Church – Bowling Green, KY

Every Diocese in the Episcopal Church has a yearly convention, and each Diocese is looks a little bit different. In the Diocese of Kentucky, our Convention is always held the Friday and Saturday of Veteran's Day Weekend, and it alternates between being held at the Cathedral in Louisville to being hosted by a congregation in the Diocese. Christ Church, Bowling Green has hosted our Convention before, and this year it returns to BG. It's an opportunity to host the Bishop, clergy, and congregants from around the Diocese. For the Convention, every congregation is allotted a set number of delegates to attend to represent their congregations based on their parish size. Convention is a great time to worship together, to share in our common mission of the Diocese, which, to summarize, is to embrace Christ and engage the world. There is also business to be done at the convention that is a larger scale version of our Parish Annual Meeting that we hold in January: elections to positions, budget hearings, and sharing about the state of the Diocese. We will need volunteers to make this event happen, so be on the lookout ways to help welcome the Diocese of Kentucky to CECBG!

The General Convention of the Episcopal Church – June 23-28, 2024 Christ Church Cathedral – Louisville, KY

The General Convention (GC), in contrast, is only held every three years and is much longer; this year it will be six days long and there is much exciting business on hand. Every GC has lots of work to do on resolutions, budgets, and decisions for the wider church, and just like the Diocesan Convention, all the Dioceses are present and are allotted a set number of delegates to send and every Bishop in the Episcopal Church attends as well. Father Steve can speak to the business side of GC much better than I can, as he's attended more than once. The biggest work on hand this year is that those clergy and delegates in attendance will vote on a new Presiding Bishop for the Episcopal Church, as The Most Rev. Michael Curry's nine-year term ends. The volunteer needs to welcome thousands of people to Louisville for GC




from every corner of the Episcopal Church are much more substantial, requiring 800-1,000 volunteers. While folks from all over the country will pitch in, we do hope to have significant involvement from the Diocese of Kentucky present. 

Reading is Power

New Location for Christ Episcopal Church's Adult/Youth Library

With the birth of the concept of writing came the birth of reading. Initially, early texts were meant to be heard rather than seen. Reading silently did not take place until improvements were made in literacy, simplification of language, punctuation, the inclusion of pictures, and accessibility to more books on behalf of the general public. These improvements encouraged silent reading to become the norm.

In the 13th and 15th centuries, print revolution further increased readers' desires and access to books and papers. Johannes Gutenberg developed the first mechanical printing press in Strasbourg, Germany in the 1430s. By the 1450s, copies of the Gutenberg Bible were available to the public at large. Churches all over Europe embarked on a spree to educate the masses. Booksellers printed copies of popular ballads and folklores. Periodicals started to be published in the early 18th century. Charles Dickens's *Pickwick Papers* were published in a magazine in 1849, making it more accessible and affordable to the public.

The organizing and cataloguing of written materials came many years before the introduction of formal libraries. However, the establishment of lending or circulation libraries, coupled with the advent of new printing technologies, revolutionized reading for the common people. The availability of written material to the public was powerful; power that could easily be transferred onto its readers.

Recently, Christ Church's Adult/Youth Library was moved from Cates Lounge to the resource room next door to the children's resource room and library (Near the church's office on the College Street side of the building.). Book donations have been generous and the library ran out of room in Cates Lounge. The new resource room will allow for the storage and display of more adult and youth books. Why not increase your power? Check-out a book!
