From The Rector

Dear Friends¹,

I'm a sucker for the numbers game. When numbers are up, I get jazzed. When things go down, I take it personally. 2019 brought with it a second straight year of decrease in our Average Sunday Attendance (ASA), which makes me sad. Mother Becca was quick, and wise, to point out that this fifteen-person decrease is directly attributable to the growth in our parish prayer list. These fifteen, average people, have names, we know their stories, and we pray for and visit with them with regularity. Still, while numbers aren't the be-all and end-all of church life, our task, as followers of Jesus is to share the Good News, which will, in time, grow the church.

At the same time we were wrapping up the 2019 statistics, I was in a conversation with a friend of mine, whom some of you know, the Rev. David Simmons. David was wondering aloud what research was out there on what causes Episcopal congregations to grow. I'm fond of saying that "we can't out Baptist the Baptists." We won't be getting a praise band anytime soon. Our fog machine is James Brown with a thurible on Christmas and Easter. How can we be authentically who we are as Episcopalians in Bowling Green while also finding ways to reach out to potential new members?

In the midst of that conversation, I ran across a report developed by our Canon for Congregational Development, Jason Lewis. Using the 2014 Episcopal Church News and Facts Report, Jason came up with eight characteristics of growing congregations.

Purpose-Driven Growth – congregations know why they exist.

1. Spiritual Vitality – congregations are connecting people with God
2. Willingness to Change and Adapt – accepting that the only constant is change
3. Engaging and Vibrant Worship – Sundays are joyful, vibrant, and exciting
4. New Member Recruitment – evangelism is for everyone
5. Follow Up and Care – closing the back door by engaging with visitors
6. Active Involvement in Special Fellowship Events – people who like to be together
7. Updated Website and Communications Media – say it, and say it again

Here at Christ Church, we do some of these things really well, while we are working on some others. Our mission statement is pervasive. We know why we do the things we do. I am profoundly grateful for your willingness to stretch and grow, to change and adapt. I experience our Sunday worship at both 8 and 10 to be joyful and life giving, all while also being authentically Anglican. With our new App and podcast feed, we will be able to reach you via at least nine different sources. We could still use some work on our spiritual vitality, which will better equip us to share the Good News. Connecting new members to ministries continues to be an area of focus for our staff and the fellowship committee is working hard to find ways to get us connected. In all things, we strive to do our best for the glory of God.

It isn't just about numbers, but about the work of the Church. These characteristics of growing congregations are indicative of how we are living into our own specific mission to worship God with joy and wonder, learn and grow together, and radiate God's love to all. I'm thankful for your willingness to live into that mission, and I look forward to another year of adaptation, growth, and faithfulness.



From The Associate Rector

Before I entered into formal discernment for the priesthood, I took up informal discernment and spent about three years praying and asking question of God, of myself, and of my community about who I was, who the church was, and how might my gifts best be used. And while I found the formal discernment process and incredibly important and sacred part of my journey, I wouldn't trade my years of informal discernment for anything.

My discernment partners were Episcopal priests and lay folks, but also a Baptist hospital chaplain and a devout young Muslim woman; in fact, the first person who ever named that I should become a priest was a woman of the Baha'i faith. At the writing of this article, I am about to celebrate the second anniversary of my priestly ordination, and my mind is drawn to reflect not just all that has happened since then, but all that got me there in the first place.

One of my favorite illustrations of a Lenten practice was not that we ought to beat our brows and drastically shift our lives, but that small practices, every day, will significantly alter where we are in 40 days. One of my seminary professors described it as a point from which an arrow emerges, but if you change that starting point by a tiny amount, the direction of the arrow will be in a much different place. I always get really excited about Lent, because I like the challenge, but it's also a beginning that is so full of hope. Imagine where we might be, come Easter Day? How might you be a better Christian, mother, grandfather, citizen?



The key to this sort of hope at the cusp of the season of Lent, I think is a similar process of informal discernment.

Take time before Ash Wednesday on the 26th to think of what you might forgo this season, or what practices you might take on. When we discern about a decision, big or small, we enter into intentional prayer about the decision; we ask for God's help in knowing which direction we ought to go. In discernment, prayer is our constant companion; it is always with us, and when we take time to see it, the direction it points us becomes clear.

I'm a firm believer that discernment also requires community, partially because my discernment for Holy Orders was so rooted in community. But I think that community can help us discern many things, big life decision or our daily Lenten practices. So, spend this time in prayer, and in conversation about what Lent might look like for you. And discernment can be a labor-intensive, drawn out process, but it can also be a daily one-minute prayer about what Lent might need to be for you. Enter into these few weeks before Lent to come to prayer, to find stillness, even if it is just long enough to ask "What could this Lent hold?" Be open to where God might be calling you, and have a conversation about it with those that you trust.

Our Lenten practices can feel like a very private matter, and sharing them might feel counterinitiative, but what I'm asking is not that you share your practices with folks, but that before you even start, you share in the questions that arise as you are in discernment about Lenten practices. So whether you discern that it's best to give something up for Lent, or to take a practice on, or some combination of both, you all remain in my prayers in the days leading up to Lent. May we all keep prayers as our daily companion and be attentive to the movement of the Spirit.
