FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

By now, you are all certainly aware of Mother Becca's call to serve as Canon Missioner in the Diocese of Lexington. As I've said to her and others, Becca was ready to leave the nest several years ago, and our extended time with her as been a true blessing and joy. As we prepare to wish her well on her move to the other side of the Commonwealth, I'm reminded of a theme that comes up often in the life of faith - liminal space.

Liminal comes from a Latin word that means "threshold." It is laterally the space between what is and what is not yet. As Christians, we live constantly in liminal space between Christ's first coming at Christmas and his second coming at the end of days. We walk on the threshold of the Kindgom of Heaven day in and day out.

Of course, there are more tangible examples of liminal space, as we are experiencing now. We are in the in-between space of knowing that Becca is leaving and not knowing what will come next. This place of not knowing is probably the hardest kind of liminal space. We humans like to know what's coming next. We like to control outcomes. We like to see the future.

With God in control, however, we are invited to learn to trust, to sit in the discomfort of liminal spaces and to prayerfully discern what comes next. That is what we will do here. We will take some intentional and prayerful time asking the Holy Spirit what we might be called to do with our staffing structure in this next phase of our life. We'll listen to you. We'll listen to the needs of this community. We'll listen to the hopes of the diocese. Then, only when we are ready to move forward in faith, will we step through the doorway, over the threshold, and into a new future.

I invite your prayers as we discern together. I welcome your input. I look forward to our holy and intentional liminal space.

FROM THE ASSOCIATE RECTOR

Dear Church,

Over my time at Christ Church, I've preached many times on how joy and sadness are commingled together. I write today with this commingled joy and sadness as I share that I have accepted a call to serve as Canon Missioner in the Diocese of Lexington and that my last Sunday with Christ Church will be January 12th.

I am excited to begin this next phase of my priestly work in our neighboring diocese, and in this role I will have the opportunity to aide smaller faith communities, particularly in the Appalachian region of Kentucky, discern and pray about where God is calling them and how God has already or will equip them for this work. As Canon Missioner, I will also work with Bishop Mark Van Koevering, the rest of the Diocese of Lexington staff, and diocesean leadership to implement a vision for the breadth of the diocese; I look forward to starting this work on February 10th after some time off for rest and transition.

The joy of this call to the Diocese of Lexington is clear and abundant, but it does not come without sadness. When Father Steve brought me to interview in person in April 2017 during my last year of seminary, I sat at Spencer's on the square and journaled about how I knew that Bowling Green and Christ Church was where I felt called, and this congregation has been in my prayers since that day, which is where it will remain. The opportunity to spend the first years of my priesthood here at Christ Church has been a gift I will treasure for the rest of my life. I am so grateful to have grown so much as a preacher, teacher, pastor, and priest as we have walked together through these years.

As a faith community and parish staff we've grieved through the pandemic, natural disasters, life-threatening illnesses, accidents, divorces, and deaths and we've celebrated recovery, healing, marriages, births, and graduations. And all of it has been holy because this is a congregation that walks together, no matter joy or sadness; a beautiful talent of this parish. One of the other sermons I often preach is about my hard-won love for Saint Paul and his writings to the early church, so I'll close this with his opening to the letter at the church at Philippi, which now makes much more sense than ever before:

"I thank my God every time I mention you in my prayers. I'm thankful for all of you every time I pray, and it is always a prayer full of joy."

- Philippians 1:2-4

You are so willing to jump in and help with any and all needs our programs have whether it's decorating for the Rise and Shine Easter breakfast right after the Easter Vigil Service; humoring my excitement about the latest Godly Play lesson that has been released; creating more spaces for our children like the Atrium and the Sensory Room; or making pompom sheep for Blessing of the Backpacks. You help provide meals for our youth and donations for the Blessings Trees (THREE in 2024 and clearing all those ornament tags!) We helped over 200 families with Affordable Christmas, Lots of potential pets, and SIX Purples students have the best Christmas ever! You have helped alleviate holiday stress for those families and groups that help in our community at large.



Amen.









The documentary is available to watch online from Thanksgiving through the end of January 2025 for \$11. It is a phenomenal story that needs to be heard and witnessed.



Bread of Angels is a small group exploring what it means to live a Christian Life in the world in which we find ourselves. Formed in 2004 and resurrected post-covid, BoA describes itself as a book club with a theological bend – a format that supports dialogue as each of us wrestles with our authors and with God.

In January we will begin reading Richard Rohr's Falling Upward.

Fr Richard Rohr (b 1943) is a Franciscan Priest globally recognized as an ecumenical teacher and theologian. He is the founder of the Center for Action and Contemplation in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Fr. Richard's teaching is grounded in the Franciscan alternative orthodoxy--practices of contemplation and self-emptying, expressing itself in radical compassion, particularly for the socially marginalized. He has published 34 books. *Falling Upward* was originally published in 2011; we will be reading a somewhat revised 2024 edition.

Rohr is famous for saying "We do not think ourselves into new ways of living, we live ourselves into new ways of thinking."
