
FROM THE ASSOCIATE RECTOR

Dear Church,

I'm a sort of person that's very comfortable in the dark and heavy spaces of life. Wether it's because of the way I've had my own difficulties and struggles or those around me, I find a sense of ease when things are difficult. And like most things, it being one of my greatest strengths also makes it one of my greatest weaknesses, because I, paradoxically, do not find joy that comes easy. Our liturgical seasons guide us through all sorts of conditions of life, and if Lent is a time for penitential sorrow, Eastertide is time for unabashed joy.

I know that for me, joy always always stems from a sense of gratitude about the natural world around me, the gifts and privileges of my life, and finding humor in our shared humanity. As we enter Eastertide, I'd like to invite you each into the 50 Great Days of Eastertide with the hope of each day finding bits and moments of joy. The Alleluias will ring out throughout our services during this time, and my prayer is that they will come easy in your personal life as well.

And because this practice doesn't come easy for me, I find I often need a companion along the way. One resource that I plan to return to this Easter Season is Ross Gay's book, *The Book of Delights:* Essays, in which he writes 100 essays on what sparks delight in him over the course of this 40th year of life. If you have resources that you plan to turn to as you lean toward the unabashed joy of Eastertide, I'd love to hear them!



"Because in trying to articulate what, perhaps, joy is, it has occurred to me that among other things—the trees and the mushrooms have shown me this—joy is the mostly invisible, the underground union between us, you and me, which is, among other things, the great fact of our life and the lives of everyone and thing we love going away. If we sink a spoon into that fact, into the duff between us, we will find it teeming. It will look like all the books ever written. It will look like all the nerves in a body. We might call it sorrow, but we might call it a union, one that, once we notice it, once we bring it into the light, might become flower and food. Might be joy."




March 2024 Worship Survey Results Interpreted by The Rev. Dr. Steve Pankey

Which service do you most regularly attend? 75 responses



45 respondents attend 10am in-person, while 23 attend 8am in-person. This is a 60/30 split, which is generally in line with our average Sunday in-person attendance. The other 10% is comprised of those who worship at 8am online (1), those who worship at 10am online (5), and those who attend on Wednesday (1).


What is the most important reason for attending that service?



Among all respondents, Time of Day was the most cited reason for attendance with an average score of 4.29. Music or the Lack Thereof (3.56) and Friends (3.24) were a close grouping on the north side of importance, while a Preference for Rite I came in fourth at 2.1 and needing to stay home rounded out the survey results.


If you attend 8am, is Rite I language an important part of your worship experience? 35 responses



The impetus for this survey came one Sunday as I looked at the 8 o'clock service and wondered if there were more than a couple of people for whom Rite I was important. To say I was surprised at these results is an understatement, with a full 2/3 of respondents indicating Rite I is an important part of their worship experience.


How often do you attend services?

What aspects of worship do you find most meaningful?




Among all Respondents, Holy Eucharist was the most meaningful aspect of worship with an average score of 4.92. Sermons weren't far behind at 4.47. Ritual and Tradition was the only other outright preference at 3.69 while fellowship (2.75), music (2.60), and communal prayer (2.56) were all near



the middle of the pack. Among 10am Respondents, musically logically moves toward the front of the pack, slotting in as the 3rd most important aspect with an average score of 3.27.


I would like to see more services that combine 8 and 10 so that we can all be together. 73 responses




I find the 5th Sunday Piano Mass to be refreshing 68 responses






