From The Rector

Dear Friends,

Recently, Spotify and The Echo Nest published some interesting survey results about how people interact with music. According to this study, people stop engaging with new music at the age of 33. It isn't that you don't find new music to listen to, just that the new, popular music ceases to be appealing. They posit two reasons. First, we aren't as tied to FM radio as we once were, so it's easier to find more obscure genres that appeal to us. Second, we tend to return to the music that we listened to growing up as a way of coping with the changes and chances of the world around it. Music acts, in some ways, like a security blanket.

While I have no doubt in the veracity of this study, anecdotally, I can say that it isn't true for me. Not that it probably wouldn't be true, but that because I have children who are 14 and 11 and love listening to music, I'm exposed to all kinds of new songs on a regular basis. We rejoiced with "1989 Taylor's Version" dropped a few weeks ago. Not to brag, but Spotify tells me that I was among the first 5% of listeners of "Harry's House," Harry Styles last new album in May of 2022. The new song I'm in love with right now is "Stick Season" by Noah Kahan.

Kahan is from Vermont, and this song tells of the hardship of going through a breakup during "stick season"; late fall and winter when the days are short, the nights are long, and everything seems pretty dreary. When we moved the clocks back an hour and the sun began to set at 4:45 pm, "Stick Season" spoke to me, and maybe it does to you as well. This time of year can be difficult to navigate. There are the pressures of the holidays, stresses with family, leaves to rake as far as the eye can see, and not even the beauty of nature seems to be there to offer refreshment.

If you are having a tough time with stick season, know that you aren't alone. Find a friend to talk to. Find a good book to read. Spend a little more time in prayer. And maybe, do a little digging in your favorite music streaming app or on the FM dial for



a new song, one that maybe sparks some joy or helps you reminisce about the good old days. If you need a suggestion, from Oliva Rodrigo to Zach Bryan, I'm here for you.

From The Associate Rector

Every Advent season, I turn toward my collection of daily Advent meditations to see which one might best meet how I need to approach the season; each one has a different style and feel. If you are looking for a daily Advent companion, here are three selections from my favorites:

Watch for the Light: Readings for Advent and Christmas

Waiting is not a very popular attitude. Waiting is not something that people think about with great sympathy. In fact, most people consider waiting a waste of time. Perhaps this is because the culture in which we live is basically saying, "Get going! Do something! Show you are able to make a difference! Don't just sit there and wait!" For many people, waiting is an awful desert between where they are and where they want to go. And people do not like such a place. They want to get out of it by doing something.

In our particular historical situation, waiting is even more difficult because we are so fearful. One of the most pervasive emotions in the atmosphere around us is fear. People are afraid—afraid of inner feelings, afraid of other people, and also afraid of the future. Fearful people have a hard time waiting, because when we are afraid we want to get away from where we are. . . The more afraid we are, the harder waiting becomes.

Honest Advent

Incarnation is the process of being seen. . . Why is being seen so hard? It's hard because when you decide to live into your true self – your strengths and weaknesses, your life and shadow, your superpowers and your kryptonites—you are revealing yourself to the world, and you can now be touched. Loved, rejected, embraced, ignored. . .and all of the other complicated interactions that come with human relationships. This is the exciting and terrifying proposal in an everyday life, so that some of us are questioning whether revealing yourself is worth it.

One of the invitations of Advent is the contemplation of God being seen, which is to say, incarnation.

I Witness

Christmas is not the same old story told over and over again. Christmas is a glimpse, the chipping away at a truth that exists so far beyond human comprehension that all we can do is point to it. We must touch upon this truth over and over again for the entirety of our lives and beyond, not as repetition but as an attempt to go deeper, to approach this story from a fresh angle, to try again to plumb the depths of its meaning.

The Maker of the Universe became human flesh. The birth of Jesus is the greatest form of communication from God that we have ever known. And we will never be able to fully understand this gift that God has given us.


