FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

I was scrolling through Instagram recently when I stumbled upon a headline that said that a day of rest a week was good for physical and mental health. My initial reaction was, "Well duh. The Hebrews figured this out some 5,000 years ago." But of course, we don't always do what is good for us and so generation after generation, we have to learn the same lessons. Sabbath is no exception.

I am grateful that our tradition respects and honors rest. Since our ties to the Church of England and a learned clergy also have us closely associated with academia, sabbaticals have been a mainstay for Episcopal clergy from many years. In my letter of agreement is the stipulation that for every year of service, I accrue two weeks of sabbatical leave that can be taken anywhere from year 5 to 7. As I approach my seventh anniversary here, it is time for me to take a rest.

With the Vestry's permission, I am excited to announce that from April 1 through June 30, 2024, I'll be taking a much-needed sabbatical. This will be my second sabbatical since I was ordained back in 2007. During my first, I spent most of my time writing my Doctor of Ministry thesis. It was good to have that time to accomplish such a monumental task, but I failed miserably in the rest component. Given the relentless nature of the 2020s, from COVID-19 to tornadoes, and beyond, I'm not making that mistake again this time.

I do have some plans for study during my time away. My dad's family were Huguenot refuges who escaped France through England and were settled in an abandoned Native American village on the James River. That village, now known as Manakin Sabot, Virginia has a little Episcopal Church that was founded to minister to those refuges in 1701. Next to it, sits the Huguenot Historical Society Archives. I plan to spend a week in southern Virginia digging into the archives and learning what I can about the story of Jean Pantier (John Pankey), whose name my own father still carries.

Beyond that time of study, I've got some fun planned. A few concerts, a weekend at the PGA Championship in Valhalla, and lots of time with my girls. I look forward to an intentional time of rest and refreshment, and I know that the parish is in good hands while I'm away. Thank you all for the permission to rest, I will not let you down.

FROM THE ASSOCIATE RECTOR

Dear Church,

As I write this letter, the Christmas bulletins are piled up, the sermon prep is at work, and my office looks like it's a year when Advent 4 falls on Christmas Eve. I'm ready to wrap up 2023, and am looking forward to a lot of what 2024 holds. One of the biggest things that this next year will hold is an inaugural Episcopal Campus Ministry (ECM) Pilgrimage. In my own life, I know how powerful a pilgrimage can be; it's a time to grow and stretch and change. It's a powerful and beautiful opportunity that can deeply shape and form your faith. And with the help of a grant, or backup support from the Bishop, ECM will get to take that as well.

The Young Adult and Campus Ministries arm of The Episcopal Church has a grant process that runs every Fall. Grants can range from start ups of new ministries, revitalizing older ones, or to build and grow existing ones. In 2022, I considered applying for the grant, but discerned it wasn't yet time. When the 2023 timeline for the grant was published, it didn't take much time or prayer for an idea to come to the surface. I introduced the idea to the students early in the semester, and we kept it in our prayers and discussions and it became more and more clear that this was something the students desired. So much so that I quickly realized that I would have to figure out a significant backup plan if we weren't selected to receive the grant, as the recipients are not announced until February. The students were attached, excited, and hopeful about the idea of going on pilgrimage by October. Thankfully, as I was telling the Bishop about it, he affirmed that this is a great opportunity for these young Episcopalians to get connected to their faith, as well as to the broader Anglican Communion.

In late May, I will take four students, one recent graduate and three rising seniors, to walk the last 60 miles of the Camino de Santiago de Compostela. We have watched movies, read books, and begun planning. They are excited to engage what every person experiences on the Camino: the abundant provision of God's care and love and a strengthening of their faith identity. I've learned in my work with College Students that there is a longing for a faith that matters that both enacts change and changes us as well. We'll connect with the Anglican Centre in Santiago while there and engage with people from around the world who all come to that ancient trail for what the Camino offers.

I know my own experience on the Camino two years ago significantly shaped me, and I'm as excited to walk a portion of the trail that I didn't do last time as I am to share that sacred space and ancient tradition with these young people. I know that they will forever be changed by taking a pilgrimage at this point in their lives with so many big life changes ahead of them, and I'm prayerful that it will help to ground them not only in God's care, but also in their faith as well.

Bread of Angels


