



From The Rector

Dear Friends,

There are many aspects of Christ Church that help us fulfill our mission. It begins, of course, with each of you. Without a membership that is committed to worshiping God, learning and growing, and radiating God's love, we'd be nothing more than a social club that meets at really inconvenient hours. Your Vestry, the representative leaders of our parish help us to discern new ways of being the Church in our corner of the world. Our staff works tirelessly to support the work of our members and to be the light of Christ in our community.

One of the unsung components of our mission are our community partners. We are continuously blessed through our relationships with the other downtown churches through Churches United in Christ HELP Ministry. We radiate God's love as a part of MEALS INC. Your volunteer efforts on boards, at farmer's markets, in classrooms, and all over Warren County mean we are radiating God's love far beyond our walls.



This week, Mother Becca and I had the pleasure of attending the HOTEL INC Church Partner Thank You Lunch. During our 90-minute time of fellowship and learning, I was reminded of just what a gift it is to be partnered with HOTEL INC and their amazing staff. Rhondell Miller, our own Shelley Carter, and Katy Attanasi shared what HOTEL INC has done in 2023, what they continue to learn, and how we can grow in our relationship with them. A few highlights struck me.

First, we heard the sobering statistic that people living in the 42101 zip code have a life expectancy of at least four years less than any other zip code in Warren County! That's the zip code our church exists in. It's the zip code I live in. It is a stark reminder that poverty kills, and in a community as strong as ours, we must do better.

Second, HOTEL INC currently employees 3 full time and 1 part time navigators. These 3.5 full-time equivalent miracle workers were helping 93 households as of August 1. In the first two weeks of August, they've added 59 new households. That's 152 households at or near the edge of food insecurity, homelessness, eviction, or foreclosure. Each full-time navigator is working with more than 40 households through some of the most challenging times they will ever face. They need our prayers and our ongoing support to help these neighbors of ours find long-term security and sustainability.

Finally, the Delafield CO-OP Market is nearing 400 members. This market has turned a food desert in Delafield into an oasis of fresh fruit, local vegetables, meat, and some pretty neat locally sourced snacks. You can join the CO-OP for a one-time fee of \$60 and enjoy all the market has to offer.

I'm grateful to have HOTEL INC as one of our key community partners. I hope you will continue to support them in their amazing work.

From The Associate Rector

Maybe it's because I taught Pre-K for six years before I went to seminary, but I love the energy of the end of Autumn and the beginning of school. Even though I don't have kids, it's an energy that changes all around us. But I've noticed something recently in many of my friends, in the conversations I overhear at the store, and in podcasts and articles I read, that this time of year, along with excitement and energy, also has a sense of weariness to it. The Fall is such a full time and before we know it, Christmas comes barreling around the corner. And even though I enjoy this time of year, even I can sense the way in which things can feel preemptively heavy.

I think there are a number of ways to identify what might actually be happening, and nearly all of them might have some truth to them: COVID changes, overscheduled lives, and just a general tiredness all seem to cast a shadow on what little down time many folks have. At some point, if this weariness sounds at all familiar, I'm sure you, like me, have thought, "well, what can you do?" There is this false sense that we cannot change the pace at which our lives move. Obviously we can, but it is often at great cost to our ways of life and one many of us are not willing to pay to make changes.

And if you find yourself at all in that space this season, I'd like to invite you to consider what sort of micro-changes you can make. You don't have to pull all of your kids out of all of their sports, but how do you engage with them with intentionality? What does it look like to share not just our busy schedules, but to take a vulnerable moment and connect with another over the burdens and joys you carry simultaneously. How can your life take on moments of transformation, not into something wholly new, but into a restoration of what you love?

Around this time every year, I return to one of my favorite theological memoirs written by the late Frederick Buechner, and this week, this quote that I've highlighted and underlined and circled throughout the years came to find me once again,

But when it comes to putting broken lives back together—when it comes, in religious terms, to the saving of souls—the human best tends to be at odds with the holy best. To do for yourself the best that you have it in you to do—to grit your teeth and clench your fists in order to survive the world at its harshest and worst—is, by that very act, to be unable to let something be done for you and in you that is more wonderful still. The trouble with steeling yourself against the harshness of reality is that the same steel that secures your life against being destroyed secures your life also against being opened up and transformed by the holy power that life itself comes from. You can survive on your own. You can grow strong on your own. You can even prevail on your own. But you cannot become human on your own.

We are a people and a faith built upon community and to be Christian requires us to lean toward not only the light of Christ, but also to each other. This is my prayer for this hectic season: that anyone in need of it will find the space to be opened up and transformed by God's love and grace, and that you will find community and intentionality that helps you live into your fullest human and Christian self.






Service Minister Training

Sunday, September 17th After Each Service

Our Sunday services take a lot of people to make happen. Below are several of the ministries for which we are looking for volunteers. We look forward to getting back to a full crew on Sundays, and there is a spot for everyone third grade and up!

Acolyte

Acolytes assist in the liturgical of movement of the service. We have one acolyte at 8am, typically an adult, and up to five at the 10am service, typically youth and children.



Intercessor



Intercessors lead the congregation in prayers. We have one intercessor at each service

Shepherds

Shepherds help monitor Surface Hall in case there is a need during the service and greet latecomers to the service. We have one security shepherd at 8am and three at 10am.



Audio/Visual Team

The A/V Team will help facilitate our online worship and will need to be trained by Rick and Linda Mitchell.



Lector

Lectors read our scripture passages set for the service. We have one lector at 8am and three at 10am.



Usher

Ushers greet people, hand out bulletins, and help folks find seats if needed. We have one usher at 8am and four at 10am.



Altar Guild

The Altar Guild is responsible for setting the Sanctuary and Chancel for the the service, including the Eucharistic elements, song board, and altar hangings. We have one at 8am and two at 10am; those interested will be trained by Deacon Kellie.
